Cornrows: The Basics

- Use your pinky finger to scoop clean sections as you braid

The foundation of cornrowing starts with clean, detangled hair and precise partings to ensure symmetrical results.



For beginners: Practice small sections first, focusing on technique rather than intricate designs. Proper finger positioning significantly impacts your final result.

Cornrows: Stitch Cornrows

Create Clean Partings

Use a tail comb to create precise, even horizontal sections. The spacing between rows creates the signature "stitched" appearance.

Maintain Visible Scalp Lines

The distinct feature of stitch cornrows is the visible scalp "stitches" between each row. Keep partings consistent in width.

Achieve Geometric Precision

Stitch cornrows are ideal for creating crisp, clean geometric patterns and designs. Perfect for both minimalist and complex styles.



Cornrows: Creative Designs





Flowing curved cornrows create soft, organic designs that frame the face beautifully. These patterns require smooth transitions and consistent tension.



Geometric Styles

Zig-zags and angular patterns make bold statements. These designs require precise partings and careful planning before braiding begins.




Width Variations

Box Braids: Traditional



The distinctive root knot secures synthetic hair firmly at the base, creating the signature look and durability of traditional box braids.

Key Characteristics

- Created with synthetic hair secured by a visible knot at the root
- Scalp divided into square or box-shaped parts (1/4" to 1" wide)
- Provides excellent durability, lasting 6-8 weeks with proper care
- Creates fuller, more voluminous look compared to other styles
- Moderate tension at the root provides stability but requires careful installation
 - Traditional box braids have been a cornerstone of Black hair culture for generations, offering both protection and versatile styling options.

Box Braids: Knotless Method

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Root Technique

Extensions are fed in gradually as you braid, creating a seamless transition with no bulky knot at the base. This results in a flatter, more natural appearance at the scalp.

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Comfort & Protection

The knotless method significantly reduces tension on the scalp, minimizing breakage and traction alopecia risk. Braids move more freely and feel lighter on the head.

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Installation Considerations

Installation typically takes 30-50% longer than traditional box braids. The style may frizz more quickly at the roots but offers superior comfort for sensitive scalps.



Microbraids & Feed-in Braids

Microbraids

- Extremely thin braids (pencil lead to matchstick width)
- Requires exceptional precision and patience
- Can blend seamlessly with natural hair textures
- Offers incredible versatility for styling
- Installation can take 8-12 hours for full head

Feed-in Technique

- Extensions added incrementally as you braid
- Creates natural-looking gradual thickness
- Ideal for sleek ponytails and updos
- Requires practice to maintain consistent tension



Both techniques require meticulous partings and consistent tension throughout to achieve professional results.
